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McLean Art Society Artist of the Month

I am a long time member of McLean Art Society and a past president. When I did a demo for MAS I liked the group so much, I decided to join.

I've been painting and teaching art for even longer. During the lockdown, I decided that this period could be a positive experience or a negative one. I opted for a positive experience and began painting every day. There were no art shows during this time, so I built up quite a collection.

For the month of July, I will have a solo show at Gallery Underground in Crystal City. The show is called "Four Seasons," and I depicted all the months I painted during the Covid pandemic. The opening reception is Friday, July 1 from 5 – 7 pm. All are invited. The show continues until July 29. I hope everyone will get a chance to see my works. I have over 40 paintings in the show. The gallery is open Monday – Friday from 10 – 6. Free parking is available. Just get your ticket stamped at the gallery.

The Big Wave



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NATHANIEL WILLIAMS

We were treated to a discussion and demonstration of a critical but sometimes overlooked part of creating good artwork...**the underpainting.**

The painting was of a gas station but had the added complexity of other buildings, telephone poles, and wires in the sky. Contrasts and perspective were always in mind as this is the point where those decisions can allow you to avoid problems down the road. Nathaniel paints in mono-color, usually red oxide or burnt umber. The focus is on values and perspectives as he communicates a sense of light and depth always being aware of the composition and the balance between objects in the painting. He looks at the verticals on the left and right to see if they are in balance and reflect the object being painted and maintains the relationships between the elements. The whole purpose is to deal with these issues early so you don't have to make changes later. Working with the limited palette of one color with multiple values helps eliminate complications later.

Keep your paint thin and think about edges, not at the start, but as you go. The location of the horizon is an important first decision. Nathaniel will place it below the halfway point on the canvas but if it is above the halfway point, then spend time with the light.

Depth is an element to consider in your 2-dimensional painting. The size of an object and its value relates to its distance.

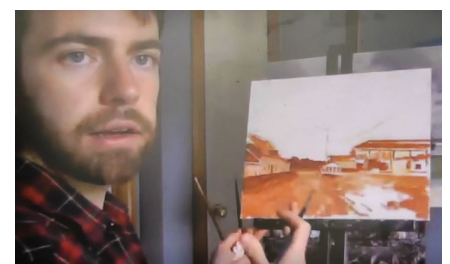
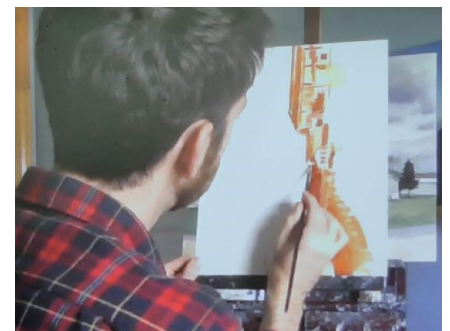
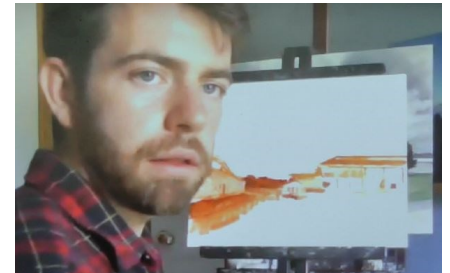
In this work Nathaniel did not block in the sky as it is an early morning sky and that means it is relatively light. The ground, in contrast, is relatively dark and so it has the focus. When the sky is painted at the end, the telephone pole and wires are painted while the paint is still wet. This is the only way to get the wires thin and sharp. When done on a dry canvas it is more difficult to get it right.

Nathaniel is offering classes at the Yellow Barn for an opportunity to learn more in person as you perfect your underpainting and realistic painting skills.

Lots of practice and experimentation. This painting is from a photo I took in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Since it is an original and I wasn't following an instructor or video, it took some time as sections were done and re-done.

Next month we will take this painting and make our own natural cedar frame by ripping the boards on a table saw, molding the edges on a router table, and cutting the four sides with a home-made table saw jig. Then we will use a frame band along with a compressed air nail gun to assemble the frame and finish it with three coats of polyurethane.

Finally, we will insert the painting in the frame, insert the points to hold it in place, add a dust cover, and the clips & wire for hanging.





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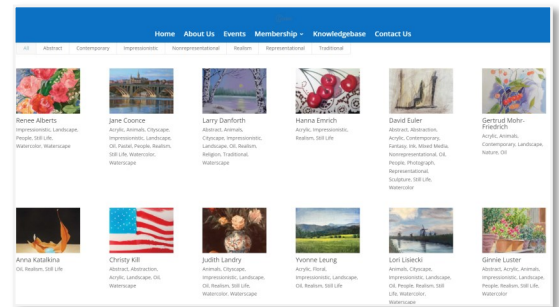
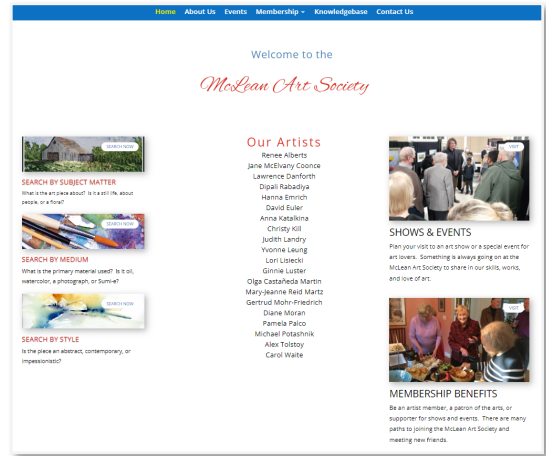
PUT YOUR OWN WEBSITE ON THE MAS WEBSITE

Keeping one website current is a never ending task. Keeping two websites current and synchronized violates a basic data fact that information kept in two places will always be different.

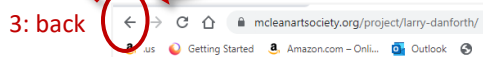
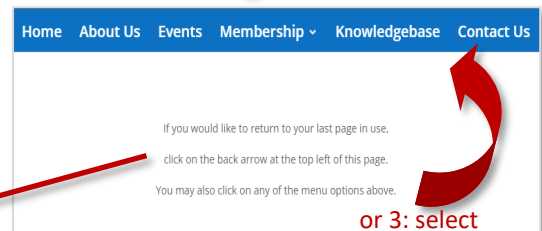
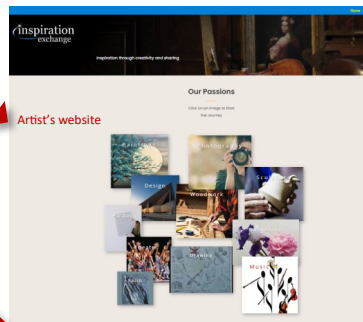
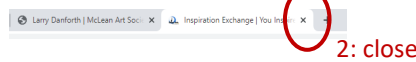
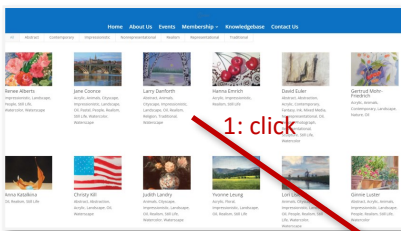
There are two ways visitors get to your personal gallery in the MAS website. One is by clicking on your name in the list in the middle of the home page and the other is by clicking on your sample painting in one of the search screens. Both take the visitor to your gallery inside the MAS website.

It is now possible to substitute your existing website for the MAS gallery. The name-list can now open your website in a new tab. When the visitor closes the tab, the MAS site is still visible and sitting on the home page.

The search pages will send the visitor to your MAS gallery as before, but that page will now automatically bounce the visitor to your website in a new tab. When the visitor closes the tab, they are on the MAS gallery page but can either use the back button at the top of the browser to go back into the search where they left off or click on any menu option to continue.
